chapter 6, pp. 134-165 2 Samuel 12 — the role of the prophet

- 1. Review the power of King David. Note that his men are engaged in battle while he lounges on a roof. What observations can you make about David's relationship to his own power?
- 2. Note that Uriah, Bathsheba's husband, is a general in David's army. What power does Bathsheba have?
- 3. This could be a case study about the dynamics of consent. The question is not only "Did Bathsheba consent?" but whether meaningful consent was possible.
- 4. After Bathsheba discovers she is pregnant, she corresponds with David. How does she choose to exercise the power she has, and how successful is it?
- 5. The pregnancy initiates a chain of events that culminates in Uriah's death. How has the church traditionally interpreted David's sin? What has this reinforced about gender roles?
- 6. When David marries the widow Bathsheba, how does that change the power dynamics?
- 7. The child Bathsheba delivers does not survive. David laments this sickness and death. What do you notice about this part of the story?
- 8. Chapter 11 appears to end the story the pregnancy crisis is resolved. Yet the prophet Nathan appears in chapter 12 with a story to tell David, about a lamb. What does this story suggest about the nature of David's sin (revisit question 5)?
- 9. Note the details of the story of the pet lamb, who is analogous to Bathsheba. What does the lamb teach us about Bathsheba?
- 10. What is Nathan's role in the story? What person or group could, or should, play this role today? What are the obstacles to this?

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
